Introduction

Midwifery, obstetric and gynecological nursing thematic area provides a course in two units as an integral part of Bachelor of Science in nursing in second and third year part of the course. This includes gynecological and reproductive health nursing in level 2 and midwifery/ obstetric nursing in level 3. It also participates in the distant and e-learning upgrading program for registered nurses to elevate them to Bachelor of Science in nursing level. In addition, the thematic area also offers training in masters in midwifery and obstetric nursing and has plans to widen its areas of interest.

student are actively engaged in theoretical and practical instructions guided by well established senate approved curriculum that is revised five yearly and made to accommodate the latest in knowledge, skills and practice. Instructions are also given in the rich historical background of the specializations in its interest and strong reflection made on future tress and perspectives. Always appreciated is the advancement in science and technology.

Students and members of staff are actively engaged in research, consultancy, community service, partnership, authorship and many other attributes that add to knowledge and the learning process. Our training is of top quality aimed at the world market. We have trained students from Tanzania and Cameroon and intend to expand in our global performance standing. To achieve our expectations, the thematic area appreciates the availability of facilities and opportunities offered by the school of nursing of the University of Nairobi. History and trends

Training in midwifery, obstetric nursing and gynecology began in the thematic area in 1996 with the beginning of training students in Bachelor of Science in nursing as part of an integrated course. At that time it was part of the department of nursing sciences housed in the faculty of medicine. Later human sexuality, gender, reproductive health and family planning were added to the training to establish the new unit of gynecological and reproductive health nursing. With gynecology relocated, the former unit now was renamed to be midwifery and obstetric nursing.

Before the Bachelor of Science in nursing program, there was no training in this area since the diploma in advanced nursing program that preceded the department of nursing sciences was only training in nursing administration and education, community health nursing and clinical nursing to help improve on clinical skills. The students were deemed to have already graduated with diploma in midwifery. They were intended after training to be tutors and administrators in nursing schools. Their intended active role in midwifery practice was therefore limited.

In 2005 training in Master of Science in midwifery and obstetric nursing began. A number of master's graduates in this area have since completed their training and are engaged in various placements.

Plans are underway to add other programs to Master of Science in midwifery and obstetric nursing. This includes considerations for Master of Science in neonatology, reproductive health, gynecology and gender health areas of specialization. This is intended to provide for a wider choice of specializations to meet the demands of service and interests in expanding high level education.

Our setting

The thematic area is situated in the School of Nursing Sciences in the heart of Nairobi, the capital city of Kenya. The school is adjacent the Kenyatta national and referral hospital, the biggest health institution in the country. It enjoys the privilege of good climate with modern communication, environmental and utility facilities. The thematic area is thus well placed to serve as a global centre of excellence in learning, research and promotion of nursing and midwifery interests. Indeed the thematic area has participated in many internationally sponsored conferences, in the country and overseas, in which its members actively participated and contributed. Those held in the country were graces by high placed personalities in the Kenyan government and beyond.

Management

The designated head of management of this thematic area is the thematic head. She is a member of the thematic heads committee, the school management board and the school academic board. She is also a member of the college academic board and the senate. In addition she also plays a role in whatever additional appointments given to her by the university, college or school.

The management of the thematic area is through organized committees, functions and roles within the thematic area. This is co-ordinated with functions in the higher hierarchy which is cascaded downwards through a structured management system.

Thematic area management is the lowest level of management in the school establishment before it triggers down to individual staff performance and involvement. Staff efforts are coordinated within the thematic areas where they have been designated.

Thematic area level of management is also guided by the standing statutes and expectations of the university, college and school. Among this is observance of the service charter, performance contract, annual work plans, performance targets, documented monitoring and evaluation, ISO management, implementation respecting the university calendar and the resolutions of the senate and other governing bodies.
